#### 1) Refugee Entrepreneurship



Lukas Valek obtained bachelor's degree in Financial Management at Faculty of Informatics and Management of the University of Hradec Kralove (FIM, UHK) and master's degree in Corporate Finance and Business at Faculty of Business and Management of University of Technology Brno. He holds PhD in field of Information and Knowledge Management from FIM, UHK. He is active in non-profit, non-governmental (NGO) sphere since 2010 and focuses on relations between NGOs and business. Since 2012 he is involved in projects of programme Erasmus+ in various roles including consultant for the Czech National Agency. His publishing activities are related mainly to non-mainstream complementary economic systems and further to migration and entrepreneurship. He has long experience in application of methods of non-formal learning in education and in project management, and since 2017 worked as Technology Scout in field of humanities (University of Hradec Kralove).



Benson Honig (Ph.D. Stanford University) is the Teresa Cascioli Chair in Entrepreneurial Leadership, DeGroote School of Business, McMaster University, Canada. His Research activities include over 120 peer reviewed publications with over 17,000 citations world-wide, focusing on professional ethics as well as subjects such as ingenuity, nascent entrepreneurship, social entrepreneurship, migration issues, and entrepreneurship in transition environments. He is past president of the Canadian Council of Small Business and Entrepreneurship; Past Chair of the Academy of Management's ethics education committee and a founding board member of the Africa Academy of Management. He is also co-founder of the Reframery, a social innovation virtual incubator supporting marginalized entrepreneurs, at www.reframery.org. We target marginalized impacted communities by reducing financial instability, supporting SMBs and self employment activities in the pre and post COVID era. We apply research findings to communities in real time, offering support of self employment training for women, refugees, minorities, immigrants, Indigenous and persons with disabilities, with proprietary research designed instructional tools, coaching, mentoring, and micro-lending at a vastly reduced cost. We are replicating our model for refugee communities 'left out' of global markets due to institutional, social and geographic constraints exacerbated by COVID.



Hulya Kaya graduated from Ankara University, Law Faculty in Turkey. She holds a Masters degree from the University of Portsmouth and a PhD from the University of Sussex. Currently, she is working as lecturer at Gedik University, Faculty of Law in Turkey. She is teaching International and European refugee and migration law. She gave a lecture to LLM students on Refugee Law within the Law Faculty, Gedik University, Istanbul between 2021 and 2022. Her thesis was published in 2020 as a book by Edward Elgar under the title 'The EU-Turkey Statement on Refugees: Assessing Its Impact on Fundamental Rights'. The book critically evaluates how the EU-Turkey Agreement on refugee issues affects the rights of refugees. She is also working as a District Governor of Pendik in Istanbul. She has implemented many socio-economic development projects related to women, children, refugees and disadvantaged persons with NGOs and international organisations.



**Mustafa F. Özbilgin** is a Professor of Organisational Behaviour at Brunel Business School, London. He also holds two international positions: Co-Chaire Management et Diversité at Université Paris Dauphine and Visiting Professor of Management at Koç University in Istanbul. His research focuses on workplace equality, diversity and inclusion from comparative and relational perspectives. He is an engaged scholar, driven by values of workplace democracy, equality for all, and humanisation of work. He has conducted field studies in the UK and internationally, and his work is empirically grounded. He has authored and edited more than 20 books and published over 200 papers in academic journals, and has served as the editor-in-chief in European Management Review and is currently serving on the editorial boards of over 20 journals internationally. His research has been supported by international and national grants.



Dr. Jörg Freiling is Full Professor and Head of the LEMEX Chair in Small Business & Entrepreneurship at University of Bremen. His major research fields are transnational, migrant and refugee entrepreneurship, entrepreneurial ecosystems, entrepreneurial support systems (incubators, accelerators), and small business management. Freiling is involved in many editorial boards and review boards of international journals and published in international journals like Journal of Management Studies, Organization Studies, Entrepreneurship & Regional Development, International Small Business Journal. 


**Tenzin Yeshi** is a Ph.D. candidate at Bremen University (LEMEX), Germany. His research primarily emphasizes the emerging research field of displaced and refugee entrepreneurship, employing an academic lens to investigate the labor market integration of transnational (forced migrant) entrepreneurs in the host country. Tenzin was also involved in Erasmus+ project "Virtual Incubator for Refugee Entrepreneurs (VIFRE)", an online business incubator platform that successfully navigated entrepreneurship education explicitly designed for refugee entrepreneurs.



Samaneh Khademi is a sociologist and researcher with a keen interest in refugee entrepreneurship and inclusion. Khademi's research focuses on the agency of refugees and their intersectional positions in relation to opportunity structures within host societies. Her PhD dissertation compares the experiences of established refugee entrepreneurs (Iranians) with a newer group of refugee entrepreneurs (Syrians) in the Netherlands. Samaneh has developed a conceptual model for studying refugee entrepreneurship that combines mixed embeddedness theory with intersectionality, which she has submitted for publication. Khademi has published an article titled "Iranian Refugee Entrepreneurship and Inclusion in the Netherlands" in the Journal of Refugee Studies, in which she emphasizes the importance of an inclusion-based approach to analyzing refugee entrepreneurship. Her research examines the inclusion of Iranian refugee entrepreneurs in terms of their sense of belonging and felt respect. Currently, she is focusing on Syrian refugee entrepreneurs and their agency in relation to intersecting backgrounds such as class, gender, age, ethnicity, and religion in the Dutch context. Through her studies, Khademi sheds light on the challenges and opportunities faced by refugee entrepreneurs, with implications beyond the Netherlands. Her research makes significant contributions to the field of refugee studies.





# 4) Refugee Entrepreneurship



Huriye Yeröz is a Senior Lecturer in Entrepreneurship at Leicester Castle Business School, De Montfort University, United Kingdom and a visiting scholar at Sabanci University, Turkey. Dr Yeröz's research concerns the identity and capital development processes of migrant-refugee and women entrepreneurship around intersecting gender, ethnicity, and social class axes. She uses diverse perspectives in her research, such as feminist theory, practice theory and institutional theory, and specialises in the narrative/life-story approach. Her work has been published in international journals. Her ongoing research is titled 'Integration of Refugees into Entrepreneurship: Empirical Analysis of New Venture Legitimation Processes in the context of Syrian Refugee Entrepreneurship in Turkey', which has received funding from the EU Horizon 2020 research and innovation programme and the Turkish Scientific and Technology Council. In addition, she has been involved in providing various academic services as a stream convener, reviewer, supervisor, and mentor for PG and PhD students. Before her PhD studies, she worked in various managerial roles for governmental organisations and international companies. She has also been involved in research projects consultancy funded by diverse bodies such as European Union, Trade and Government Agencies.

She is author of books and articles and a reviewer for the European Commission and several German ministries. She is a founding member of a regional think tank on migrant and multicultural entrepreneurship in the Ruhr Area.



Dr. Isilay Talay is an Assistant Professor in Operations and Supply Chain Management in Trinity Business School, Trinity College Dublin, the University of Dublin. She teaches in multiple MSc programs and supervises MSc dissertations in MSc in Entrepreneurship, Business Analytics, and Operations and Supply Chain Management programs. Her previous publications and research interests include promoting sustainable finance for SMEs in emerging economies, interplay of production and financing decisions, and international trade. Coupled with Turkish landscape for SMEs and refugee influx, a recent dissertation written by Meryemhan Gul lead to a joint work with Dr André van Stel and Dr Orkun Bayram to explore common success factors for refugee entrepreneurs in Türkiye, which will form the focus of our presentation.

### 5) Transnationalism and Return



Vittoria G. Scalera, Ph.D., is an Associate (tenured) Professor of International Business at the Amsterdam Business School (University of Amsterdam) and Director of the research platform "A Sustainable Future" at the Faculty of Business and Economics of the University of Amsterdam. She has been a visiting scholar at the Fox School of Business, Temple University, at the Henley Business School (University of Reading), and at Bocconi University. In 2017, she was awarded the John H. Dunning Visiting Fellowship, sponsored by the John H. Dunning Centre for International Business at Henley Business School (University of Reading). Her research mainly lies at the intersection between international business and innovation management, where she focuses on cross-border innovation, diversity in innovation teams, and the green transition of multinational enterprises. Her research has received several awards and grants, including the Academy of International Business (AIB) Conference Best Paper Award, the Global Strategy Journal Best Paper Award, an Erasmus+ grant by the European Commission, and a three-year individual research grant (VENI) by the Netherlands Organization for Scientific Research (NWO). Her works have been published or are forthcoming in leading academic journals, including the Journal of International Business Studies, Research Policy, Global Strategy Journal, Journal of World Business, and Leadership Quarterly, among others. She has recently co-edited an Oxford University Press book titled "Cross-border Innovation in a Changing World".



Robert C. Kloosterman is Emeritus Professor of Economic Geography and Planning at the Universiteit van Amsterdam. His research is guided by questions about how social, economic and cultural changes of advanced urban economies have impacted on different social groups. The transformation of urban production systems plays a key role in his work. He uses the interactionist mixed embeddedness concept to explore the relationship between shifts in the opportunity structure and the processes of insertion of migrant entrepreneurs. Apart from his work on migrant entrepreneurship, he has published on issues such as labour market developments in urban areas, and, more recently, on cultural industries, especially music and architectural design, as well as planning issues related to cultural amenities. He has advised the Dutch national Social-Economic Council and the OECD on the issue of migrant entrepreneurship. He currently leads the Horizon 2020 project Cicerone on production networks in cultural and creative industries.



Qiong Wu is a PhD candidate at IE Business School majoring in Entrepreneurship. Before joining IE, she graduated with a Bachelor's degree in Business Administration at Renmin University of China and a Master's degree in Public Policy at Chinese University of Hong Kong. She has rich working experience in government, new ventures, and listed companies. She is interested in immigrant entrepreneurship, public policy, and entrepreneurial financing. Her current research looks at the decision making of immigrant entrepreneurs and the role of remittance in this process.



Jan Brzozowski is an economist with major specialization in international migration research. He is currently an associate professor at Institute of European Studies at Jagiellonian University in Kraków, Poland and the head of the Jagiellonian Centre of Migration Studies at this university. His professional interests include immigrant, ethnic and refugee entrepreneurship, migrant's socio-economic adaptation, financial and social remittances and migrants' transnationalism. He has been published as author in such journals as Entrepreneurship & Regional Development, International Journal of Entrepreneurial Behavior & Research, International Migration, International Migration Review, European Urban & Regional Studies or Post-Communist Economies. He has coordinated & participated in several research & applied projects in the field of international migration, including Horizon Europe, Interreg Central Europe, Erasmus +, and National Research Centre (PL) grants. He explores the business assets entrepreneurs obtain from their membership in various organizations and how it influences their knowledge management processes. Stoyan has previously carried out projects on examining the business activities of entrepreneurs in the UK, Chile, Brazil and China.



Florian Koehne is a postdoctoral researcher at the Institute for Entrepreneurship at the Johannes Kepler University Linz. He received a PhD in Management from the University of Edinburgh in Scotland, where he also completed a master's degree in International Business and Emerging Markets with distinction. He has been an external research partner (pro bono) of the Universidad San Francisco de Quito in Ecuador and developed his research as a visiting scholar at the McMaster University in Canada and the Mondragon University in Spain. Prior to his academic career, he worked in the areas of international business development and marketing for the Symrise AG in Germany and Mexico.
